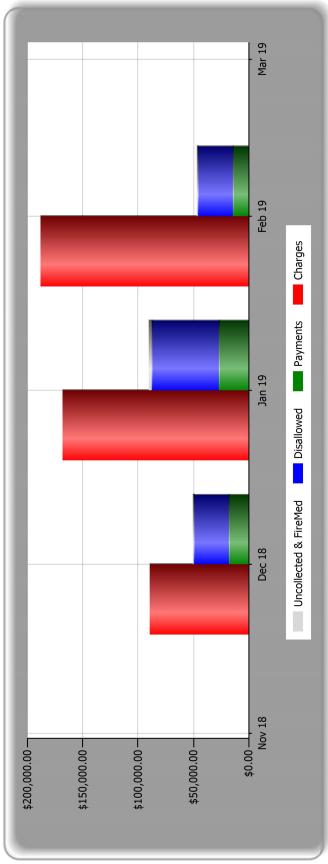

March 2019 – Chief of Operations Monthly Report

Well Spring has sprung in the Pacific Northwest. Warmer, sunnier, and dryer weather is forecast in the coming months. Pre-fire season outlook is not great, higher temperatures and dryer conditions through July 2019 are expected, we will have to wait and see if it comes true.

Operations is working on the 2019/20 budget items for both Fire Districts and finishing up the current budgeted items. Chain Saws and Wildland equipment has been purchased and the standardization continuing. CRFR and SRFD apparatus are now operating STIHL 461 Chainsaws with same chain, tools, and equipment. SRFD needs some additional saws for Tower 431 that will be replaced in the 2019/20 budget.

CRFR was awarded a grant for fire hose, Chief O'Connor and I are working on ordering replacement hose, appliances, and related equipment based on the grant. There is an opportunity to purchase some additional items, including wildland hose with an amendment request to the grant committee. We should see the new hose and equipment by late summer or early fall of 2019.

CRFR Fleet Maintenance staff members Jeramy Lehner and Raymond Malone have passed their first Emergency Vehicle Technician I (EVT I) test for Fire apparatus and ambulances. We appreciate their hard work and dedication to completing their requirements in an efficient, orderly manner. The goal for our Fleet Maintenance staff members to have their EVT by December 31, 2019. They have additional tests for ASE and EVT later this summer. Rick Fletcher, senior FM has Master Level EVT already for our shop.

CRFR is in the process to fill the EMS Chief Officer position in the coming months, the application period closes in late April 2019. CRFR is also recruiting for Firefighter/Paramedic positions to be filled by the end of the current fiscal year. We have two retirement, Lieutenant Doug Bradley and Firefighter Scott Haresnape. We wish them the best and will miss their experience and leadership at both organizations. The month of March saw several major fires in a very short period of time, attached are letters of commendation for our career, volunteer, and fleet maintenance staff that put in efforts above and beyond. We appreciate their hard work and dedication to providing the best service possible to our citizens and visitors of Columbia County.

President Cairns,

March 17/18 was A Shifts 48-hour cycle beginning on Sunday and ending Tuesday morning. On Sunday in a span of less than 12 hours the career and volunteer staff ran 20+ call for emergency service, with several critical patients in the mix.

The members of our Career, Volunteer, EMS, and Maintenance Staff performed above and beyond the call to ensure that our citizens were given professional, courteous, and compassionate service. The shift did not end with the sun setting on Sunday, in the early morning hours of Monday morning St Helens responded to a structure fire in the 100 blk of Elm Street. With minimal staffing and several ambulances out on medical calls the duty crews from St Helens, Fairgrounds, and Scappoose responded and extinguished the fire in the early stages of development. Their actions saved the home and a large portion of the occupant's belongings.

Monday began with warm, dry, and breezy conditions. A fire began in Mist/Birkenfeld and our volunteers from SRFD and CRFR responded to assist. While responding to Mist, a large fire began in Goble on Walker Road. Over a dozen vehicles and trailers were burning, threatening a number of homes. Members responded quickly, stopping the forward progress of the fire and saving several structures. Crews from Rainier, St Helens, Columbia City, and Scappoose responded. It took several hours to control and mop up the fire. During that time, we were dispatched to another fire on Pittsburg Road, we diverted crews on scene of the Walker Road fire to assist.

While we had multiple fires burning we continued to receive emergency medical calls for service. For several hours ambulances from both Districts were transporting and returning to pick up another patient, the carousel of transports did not slow till the early evening.

Our crews had just returned to quarters in the late afternoon from the Walker Road fire when we were dispatched to a large barn fire approximately 1 mile from the Walker Road fire. With engines in various stages of restocking and cleaning up from the last fire they immediately responded to this latest threat.

Crews from Rainier, St Helens, Goble, Clatskanie Fire District, and Scappoose responded to a 5000 sq./ft barn burning with spot fires in the fields surrounding it. During this fire one of our Engines (E472) became stuck in mud on the Pittsburg Road Fire. Our Fleet Maintenance crews





responded with Super Tow Truck/future Water Tender 476 to pull out the engine. This was accomplished without damage to the engine.

The barn fire was extinguished, and crews mopped up into the early evening. The rest of the shift required both SRFD and CRFR to respond to medical calls throughout the night. It was a very long 48-hour rotation.

Our Volunteer, Career, Maintenance, and EMS staff exceeded my expectations in their actions, determination, and spirit. Smiling faces, positive attitude, and hard work was evident on each scene, there was no "quit" in their minds with each emergency call for service.

The following members gave all they had during a very trying time for both Districts. Commendations, respect, and admiration for our firefighters, EMS crews, and Fleet Maintenance staff for their actions on March 17 and 18, 2019. I am proud of each member, they are the reason our Districts are successful each day. A copy of this letter will be placed in each member file. The Fire Boards for both Districts should be proud of the job and commitment to service that our members provide to our citizens.

Request to update the Resolution for the Fire Prevention Division Specifics

Proposal:

Create and add an Exhibit C for the resolution that would add fees to the Fire Prevention Division.

Driveway Inspection Fee of \$120

Driveway Re-inspection fee of \$60

<u>Plan Review Fee for plan reviews not already covered by an</u> <u>agreement</u>

> (Based upon the Building Codes Division Fire and Life Safety Review Fee. These are state controlled and are on a sliding scale based upon the cost of the project.)

The three requested fees are for fire plan review that falls outside the scope of the contracts with other government entities and a fee for costs associated with Driveway and road inspections. The requested fees would impact entities or individuals that are making property improvements only. The resolution would go into effect immediately and would be applied to new applications only, not applications currently being processed.

History:

Columbia River Fire and Rescue and the Scappoose Fire District have been performing driveway inspections for over 25 years. In 1992 the Fire Defense Board worked with the county to establish a standard and ordinance that helped to enforce provisions of the fire code as it pertained to emergency response and the challenges fire apparatus were encountering in the rural area with respect to narrow, long driveways and roads and not being able to maneuver. During the entirety of this program, staff provided the service at no cost. The typical inspection consists of driving to the property for an initial site visit, measuring the road or driveway, determining the slope, measuring for height and clearances and other factors that affect fire apparatus access roads. After the development is complete, we return for a final inspection to make sure all requirements are met and conditions followed. The paperwork review consists of a site plan review, floor plan calculations (total square footage for structure if over 3,600 square feet) and comparing this to data collected in the field. Based upon the field verified information, additional requirements may be necessary based upon access, water supply and percentage of slope of the fire apparatus access road. In the present day, we have 2 chief officers and 2 line staff that are trained to conduct these technical inspections.

Discussion:

In an effort to provide timely customer service, capture the impact to district equipment and valuable staff time for non response related responsibilities, requires another alternative to fulfill our duties with the county and the developers / builders to complete inspections.

In the past our target for inspection completion was two weeks. In the last 8 months we have gone beyond the two weeks over 78% of the time. This is due to the following:

- An increase of inspections and inspections that are continually in rural areas requiring 45 minutes or more of drive time to arrive at the inspection location.
- Using on duty staff was successful in the past when the call volume was lower. The current call volume is not conducive for these types of inspections. Staff is constantly out of position for 911 calls. Another factor is the change from the 24/48 schedule to 48/96.
- Chief officers are task saturated with administrative projects, reports and management duties.
- Reduced staff time due to:
 - \circ 300 square miles coverage area with limited staff
 - Emergency Response
 - Duty Officer Coverage
 - Training
 - Other contractual requirements
 - Other required inspections for commercial buildings
 - \circ Meetings

In addition, re-inspections make up over 68 % of for final sign offs (This is mostly due to not having address signs or other requirements being complete). This re-inspection wastes valuable staff time.

Recommendation:

Based upon our current staffing model and response demands, the most logical step would be to utilize off duty personnel who are trained and capable of performing inspections. By having the groups responsible for the impact pay for the impact, we will be able to utilize the fees to cover the overtime costs until such a point when we can hire a full time inspector. It is not reasonable for the taxpayers to subsidize the cost of growth and new construction services.

Other fees for Driveway Inspections:

Multnomah County Charges \$90 plus a security deposit of \$1,000 Columbia County Charges \$50 for an apron (Edge of the road and the first 20 feet) inspection by the road department.

Washington County \$150 initial review (Application fee) \$300 permit fee and \$500 deposit

A RESOLUTION OF THE SCAPPOOSE RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT ESTABLISHING FIRE PREVENTION DIVISION SPECIFICS

WHEREAS, Scappoose Rural Fire Protection District has an Ordinance establishing the Fire Prevention Division and Oregon Fire Code; and

WHEREAS, Scappoose Rural Fire Protection District needs to set an amount for fines for offenses, violations and hazards (Exhibit A); and

WHEREAS, the Scappoose Rural Fire Protection District has established a Fire Code Application Guideline (Exhibit B) for assistance in the application of the Fire Code in areas where compliance with the Oregon Fire Code is vague or non-specific; and

WHEREAS, Scappoose Rural Fire Protection District needs to set an amount for Fees for Road and Driveway Inspections, Road and Driveway Re-inspections and plan reviews not covered by other contracts with government entities (Exhibit C); and

NOW, THEREFORE, it is resolved that the Fire Prevention Division Specifics attached as exhibits A, B and C are hereby adopted.

EXHIBIT "A"

Violations:

Fines of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offense. Each day's continued refusal to conform to the Code or remove a fire hazard after notice by the inspecting officer is a separate offense.

Re-inspections:

Fines of not less than \$60 nor more than \$90.00 per hour may be invoiced by the Scappoose Rural Fire Protection District to persons who cause repeated reinspections due to non-compliance with provisions of the Code. The fee is based on the hourly rate of the employee performing the re-inspection. The Chief may direct the fee be charged following the second non-complying re-inspection.

False alarms:

For violations of Section 401.5 of the Fire Code and or response to 3 or more false alarms at the same location in a 24 hour time period from the first alarm, the courts may order that the responsible person or persons pay for all the costs of responding fire personnel and apparatus as set by the State Fire Marshal's schedule.

EXHIBIT "C"

Driveway and Road Inspection Fee:

A fee of \$120 per driveway or new road will be collected for the initial application review, initial inspection and final inspection.

Re-inspections for Driveways and Roads:

A fee of \$60 will be assessed for any re-inspection that is required in between the initial and final inspection. In addition, if a final is requested and not all items are completed and require another visit, a re-inspection fee will be incurred.

Example: A final is requested, and the inspector finds no address numbers on the building or at the end of the driveway.

Plan Reviews outside of existing contracts with other government entities:

In some instances, the Fire Marshal's office is requested to perform a Fire and Life Safety Inspection that is not covered by another agency. In this instance, the fees associated for such a plan review will be based upon the fees established by the State Building Codes Division for Fire and Life Safety. These fees are based upon the valuation of the project. A project estimate will be required by a design professional for verification of the project.

Example: A new bridge is being built that is part of a fire apparatus access road. Currently, the county building official or road department does not perform these types of reviews for residential properties. A plan review fee based upon the evaluation of the project will be assessed using the State Fee structure for Fire and Life Safety Review.
